### ESG OBJECTIVES [Jennifer Schloesser/Cathy Buttell]

As a Green Tier Participant, we are required to maintain an environmental management system. Within that system, we set objectives that help improve the process while striving to reduce the impacts those improvements have on the environment. In 2024, we added social and governance to the annual report to make a fully integrated ESG report (Environment, Social, Governance). This report looks at how improvements impact social, environment, and how we govern our organization. Several of our customers have ESG standards that they require. In order to retain and establish new business, Empire has taken steps to document our ESG practices to put us in position to be a preferred print supplier.

### AUTO-LAMINATORS [Jennifer Schloesser]

We built two auto-laminators, one each for MVS and SVS, completed in May 2024. The auto-laminators are designed to streamline the production process, with faster setup times and more options. Both units have the capability to take sheets and convert them into a roll to be finished on the Preco, or cut off to be die cut or i-cut. This gives options to streamline the process depending on long or short runs, and provides flexibility and efficiency based on the work.

One significant advantage of these is that they sit next to the presses, allowing one operator to feed both the printing press and the laminator (where previously, we required up to three people) or a COBOT is used to remove the sheets from the press and place them on the auto-laminator.

### ESG OBJECTIVES [continued]

### SCREEN-MAKING AUTOMATION [Cathy Buttell]

In July of 2023, we began implementation of an automated conveyor system extending from the developing CST unit. This was completed in May 2024.

This new system takes the screens coming directly out of the Zetner developer and automatically conveys them through the wall into a room with a precision blow-out and drying mechanism, which removes any residual debris and instantly dries the screens.

After that, the conveyor belt takes the screen through the next wall directly into the pinning and inspection room. Here, we relocated the 10-magazine take-

up belt to streamline inspection and prep processes, including pinning, blocking out and taping.

"We have reduced the amount of handling during the development process from six lifts to two lifts per screen," said Blake Sabine (LVS/MVS manager, previously screen making supervisor). "When you multiply that by 80-100 screens per shift, that's a lot of lifting that is now taken out of the equation. Streamlined product, less employee handling, and a quality product. What more can you ask for?"

### MVS RUNNING TO PRODUCTION RATE [Cathy Buttell]

Over the last couple of years, Empire has been researching and developing cellular manufacturing using robotic automation that combines printing, lamination, and die-cutting in a one-piece flow. A few action items needed to be completed in order to be fully functioning to production rate.



An auto-laminator was implemented in May 2024. It was added to the second MVS cell using the Cobots.

The Preco was added in 2022, but was not incorporated into the proven process until January 2024.

Programming for the Cobots was completed in June 2024.

A Kaizen was held in January of 2024 to determine the process and standard work. Job breakdowns and work instructions were updated for the 30x18 MVS print setup, MVS auto-laminator setup, and MVS preco setup.

The report for the 2023-2024 Fiscal Year will be available on our website once it has been approved by Green Tier.

### **STEPPIN' OUT IN PINK** [CATHY BUTTELL]

Steppin' Out in Pink is a non-competitive fundraising walk for all ages and abilities. It raises money to support breast cancer research and patient support programs at Gundersen Health System's Norma J. Vinger Center for Breast Care. 




### CHARTING A COURSE FOR POSITIVE IMPACT

### **SAFETY: NO-LOST TIME ACCIDENTS**

As of February 6th, 2025, we have recorded 540 days of no losttime accidents. This is a testament to our safety committee and employees for making sure safety measures are in place and department guidelines are being followed throughout the company.

On August 17th, 2023, there was an incident regarding an allergic reaction to ink being used on the press. Although this initially took our numbers back to zero, it was later determined that there was no lost time recorded, so we were able to re-instate no lost time accident numbers. To prevent potential ink reactions in the future, we updated the PPE requirements when handling inks.
